SAFETY TIPS

Here are some simple rules to reinforce and practice with your children. Remember your child's limitations; some may not be able to judge speed and distance accurately, and very young children may not be able to read the Street and pedestrian signs yet. It is important to know the abilities of your own child because all children develop uniquely.



Walking Safely

- · Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, face the traffic so that you can see cars coming and keep as far from the roadway (as far away from the traffic) as possible.
- · Cross only at corners or marked crosswalks. (If there is a crosswalk button, press the button and wait for the walk sign to indicate that it is safe to cross.)
- · Stop at the curb or edge of the road, look left, then right, and then left again (left-right-left) before you step into the street.
- · If a car is parked where you are crossing, make sure there is no driver in the car. Then go to the edge of the car and look left-right-left until no cars are coming. Keep looking for cars while you are
- · crossing.
- · Walk, don't run. This gives time for drivers to see you before you enter the roadway.

Bicycling Safety

- · Always wear a helmet that is properly fitted and complies with CSA Standards.
- · Ride on the right side of the road or trail in a single file (one bicycle behind another) in the same direction as other vehicles and come to a complete stop before crossing streets.
- · Always use proper hand signals when turning and stopping.

School Bus Safety

- · Be sure the bus driver can see you and you can see the bus driver.
- · When the bus arrives, stand at least three giant steps (6 feet) away from the curb.
- · If you have to cross the street in front of the bus, walk on the sidewalk or along the side of the road until you are five giant steps (10 feet) ahead of the bus. Then you can cross the street.
- · Never walk behind the bus.
- · If you drop something near the bus, tell the bus driver. Never try to pick it up first because the driver may not be able to see you.

Stranger Danger Safety Remind children:

- · Stay with a group.
- · Always walk with at least one friend, two or three is even better.
- · If a stranger offers you a ride, say "NO!" and stay far away from their car.
- · If a stranger follows you on foot, get away from him or her as quickly as you can. You can run and yell loudly, "HELP!" If a stranger follows you in a car, turn around and go the other direction.
- · Never leave school with a stranger.
- · Tell a trusted adult if a stranger is hanging around the school, playground, or public bathroom.
- · Leave items and clothing that display your name at home so a stranger cannot read it and use it to talk with you.
- · If you arrive home alone, call your mother, father, or other trusted adult to let them know you are home and all right. Keep the door locked, don't open the door for strangers, and don't tell strangers that you are home alone.
- · Never accept things from a stranger.
- · If a stranger asks you a question, don't talk to them. Run away.
- · Don't go anywhere with a stranger.
- · Do not share personal information on-line


EARTH DAY 2024/ COMMUNITY CLEAN UP

DRESS CODE REMINDERS

The warm weather of spring and summer is right around the corner. Students are asked to come to school dressed appropriately for outdoor weather conditions and the learning situations for a K-Gr. 8 school.

All students are to wear clothes that are appropriate for a school setting. Please refer to our school handbook.

Examples of appropriate dress for school include:

- Clothing that does not have offensive language/pictures
- Chests, stomachs, and bottoms are covered
- Shorts/skirts that are appropriate length for school setting (sport-type tights/leggings underneath may be needed)
- Undergarments are not showing
- Regular hoods/hats may be worn outside and by 7 & 8's, and inside on designated days (exclusive of religious or medical head attire/gear)
- Proper running shoes for gym classes and tech ed classes

Staff will monitor and determine what is appropriate for school and will inform the student, parent, or principal if needed. Students will be asked to change/cover up clothing that is not suitable for our learning environment. Due to health considerations and safety concerns, students must wear footwear at school.

Family Matters

What Should I Teach My Child About Safe Online Behavior?



As soon as your kids start going online, it's important to explain your expectations for their behavior. With some guidance from you, they can enjoy their time online and mostly avoid things like cyberbullying and inappropriate content. Here are some basics to share with your child:

Communicate with care. Use the right language for your audience. You might write or speak differently to a teacher, compared with a friend.

Keep private things private. Don't share private information, including passwords, your home address, date of birth, your location, or revealing photos.

Respect others and avoid drama. Be courteous and practice disagreeing politely. Try not to interact with trolls or share gossip.

Don't lie, steal, or cheat. Don't try to deceive others. Remember to give credit where credit is due. And, although it's easy to copy others' work, download things without permission, or cheat in online games, don't do it.

Be an "upstander." If someone you know is being bullied, find a way to show your support. If you feel safe confronting the one doing the bullying, you should. If not, a private message to the target of the bullying can be enough to help someone through a tough time. Speaking up against hate speech is important, too.

Report misbehavior. The internet is a giant community, and you can help it be a nicer place.

Follow your family's rules. If your parent or caregiver tells you to avoid certain websites or to stop texting after a certain time, do your best to respect their wishes. The more you act responsibly, the more privileges you'll get.

Think before you post, text, or share. Consider how you and others might feel after you've posted something. It's not always easy to take back what you've said online, and your online behavior can create a lasting footprint.

Check in with your feelings. Some online experiences can have a negative effect on our mental and emotional well-being. If you ever feel uncomfortable, worried, sad, or anxious, try taking a break and reach out to a friend or adult for help.
