EARTH DAY 2025/ COMMUNITY CLEAN UP

Earth Day celebrations will tentatively be held on Tuesday, <u>April 22</u> in the afternoon. Students at Bothwell School will be participating in a school yard and community clean up, as well as

collaborating to find ways to help our Earth. Please remember to dress appropriately for the clean-up tasks. Rubber gloves will be provided, but the older students will be cleaning in the ditches, so rubber boots might be necessary. Stay tuned for updates, as the community cleanup may be postponed if a later date would be better due to weather or the status of melting.

BOTHWELL BATTERY BLITZ CONTEST

Bothwell School has registered to participate in the Call2Recycle Battery Blitz contest which will run from March 3 to April 11. We will be collecting single use and rechargeable batteries weighing less that 5 kg. Besides regular household batteries, these include those found in power tools,

video game consoles, digital and video cameras, watches and hearing aids. The winning school will be announced in June. For Manitoba, the 1st place prize is \$3000, 2nd place \$2000, and 3rd place \$1000!

Batteries contain toxic materials that can harm the environment if they end up in landfill. That's why it's important to properly recycle your batteries!

When you collect batteries at your school, you're keeping them out of landfills and protecting wildlife. You're also helping to recover valuable materials that can be re-used to make new products, like new batteries, golf clubs, and the stainless steel pots and pans! The possibilities are endless.

Last year, the Recycle Your Batteries, Canada! program collected and recycled over 6.8 million kg of batteries. That's about the weight of 850 African elephants!

After the Battery Blitz, we will still continue to collect batteries from families and the community year round.

PHYS.ED. NEWS

Students have been practicing their jumping skills during PE classes throughout the month of March. We've enjoyed The Thunderstick Challenge, long rope, and short rope jumping. Students have grown in their confidence, love for movement, and overall fitness levels throughout this unit. Thank-you to all those who have contributed to the Jump Rope for Heart fundraiser, which culminated in our Jump Off event on the last day of school. Students raised **\$386.40** and the **5/6** class got to throw pies at willing staff members, while the rest of the school looked on.






BOTHWELL SCHOOL PRESENTS

DRESS CODE REMINDERS

The warm weather of spring and summer is right around the corner. Students are asked to come to school dressed appropriately for outdoor weather conditions and the learning situations for a K-Gr. 8 school.

All students are to wear clothes that are appropriate for a school setting. Please refer to our school handbook.

Examples of appropriate dress for school include:

- Clothing that does not have offensive language/pictures
- Chests, stomachs, and bottoms are covered
- Shorts/skirts that are appropriate length for school setting (sport-type tights/leggings underneath may be needed)
- Undergarments are not showing
- Regular hoods/hats may be worn outside and by 7 & 8's, and inside on designated days (exclusive of religious or medical head attire/gear)
- Proper running shoes for gym classes and tech ed classes

Staff will monitor and determine what is appropriate for school and will inform the student, parent, or principal if needed. Students will be asked to change/cover up clothing that is not suitable for our learning environment. Due to health considerations and safety concerns, students must wear footwear at school.

PLEASE NOTE:

- ~ ALL STUDENTS ARE TO HAVE GYM SHOES FOR GYM CLASS
- ~ GR. 7 & 8 STUDENTS MUST HAVE CLOSED-TOE SHOES FOR TECH. ED. AND HOME EC. CLASSES
- ~ SANDALS/FLIP FLOPS ARE UNSAFE FOR TECH. ED. AND PHYS. ED. ACTIVITIES



SAFETY TIPS

Here are some simple rules to reinforce and practice with your children. Remember your child's limitations; some may not be able to judge speed and distance accurately, and very young children may not be able to read the Street and pedestrian signs yet. It is important to know the abilities of your own child because all children develop uniquely.



Walking Safely

- Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, **face the traffic so that you can see cars coming and keep as far from the roadway (as far away from the traffic) as possible.**
- \cdot Cross only at corners or marked crosswalks. (If there is a crosswalk button, press the button and wait for the walk sign to indicate that it is safe to cross.)
- Stop at the curb or edge of the road, look left, then right, and then left again (left-right-left) before you step into the street.
- If a car is parked where you are crossing, make sure there is no driver in the car. Then go to the edge of the car and look left-right-left until no cars are coming. Keep looking for cars while you are
- \cdot crossing.
- · Walk, don't run. This gives time for drivers to see you before you enter the roadway.

Bicycling Safety

- · Always wear a helmet that is properly fitted and complies with CSA Standards.
- Ride on the right side of the road or trail in a single file (one bicycle behind another) in the same direction as other vehicles and come to a complete stop before crossing streets.
- · Always use proper hand signals when turning and stopping.

School Bus Safety

- Be sure the bus driver can see you and you can see the bus driver.
- \cdot When the bus arrives, stand at least three giant steps (6 feet) away from the curb.
- If you have to cross the street in front of the bus, walk on the sidewalk or along the side of the road until you are five giant steps (10 feet) ahead of the bus. Then you can cross the street.
- \cdot Never walk behind the bus.
- \cdot If you drop something near the bus, tell the bus driver. Never try to pick it up first because the driver may not be able to see you.

Stranger Danger Safety Remind children:

- \cdot Stay with a group.
- \cdot Always walk with at least one friend, two or three is even better.
- $\cdot\,$ If a stranger offers you a ride, say "NO!" and stay far away from their car.
- · If a stranger follows you on foot, get away from him or her as quickly as you can. You can run and yell loudly, "HELP!" If a stranger follows you in a car, turn around and go the other direction.
- \cdot Never leave school with a stranger.
- \cdot Tell a trusted adult if a stranger is hanging around the school, playground, or public bathroom.
- \cdot Leave items and clothing that display your name at home so a stranger cannot read it and use it to talk with you.
- · If you arrive home alone, call your mother, father, or other trusted adult to let them know you are home and all right. Keep the door locked, don't open the door for strangers, and don't tell strangers that you are home alone.
- \cdot Never accept things from a stranger.
- · If a stranger asks you a question, don't talk to them. Run away.
- \cdot Don't go anywhere with a stranger.
- \cdot Do not share personal information on-line


